ARAB SPRING VS. UPRISINGS

According to James Gelvin...

- People have used
 "spring" to describe
 other historical political
 events (1848 Springtime of
 Nations in Europe, 1968 Prague
 Spring)
- Most of the protests broke out in winter, not spring

POLITICS

- Presidents regularly modified/ extended constitutionally mandated term limits
- Restricted formation of political parties
- "State courts" operated with unclear limits, and no checks or balances

Autocracy: a country, state, or society governed by one person with absolute power, domineering rule or control.

American foreign policy in the region ramped up with the onset of the Cold War. The U.S. supported authoritarian regimes for:

- stability
- prevent Soviet influence
- economic development
- American access to oil

ECONOMIC\$

- States played a major role in the economy
- "Neoliberalism" began with Egypt in 1976 with credit from the IMF. Oil prices began rapid descent in the 1980's – many countries in debt began turning to the IMF.

Policies	Effects
Privatization	Regime loyalists bought industries
Fiscal Austerity	Spending cuts, tax increases
Reductions in government spending	Less social services
End across-the-board subsidies on consumer goods	Subsidies for only the very poorest excludes middle class

= GREATER INCOME INEQUALITY

Unemployment was around 10-12%, in some countries as high as 15%

→ In April, the unemployment rate in NC was 5.5%






Rising food costs

DEMOGRAPHICS

- 60% of the population of the Arab world is under 30, "youth bulge"
- 30% of youth between 15-29 make up the population of many Arab countries


→ 33.9% of US population is under the age of 24 (9.9% are ages 18-24)

CENSORSHIP

- In 11 of 19 Arab states surveyed, there was pre-censorship of newspapers
- Many states ban books
- Censorship of the internet common

THE SPARK

December 2010: A young, unemployed man, Mohamed Bouazizi, set fire to himself after officials stopped him from selling vegetables in Tunisia (and confiscated his wares): reminder of the daily abuse of power & lack of economic opportunities

No reliable popular representation, so people took to the streets as their first option.




The uprising in Tunisia was the first of many in the Arab world.



Demonstrated that this kind of protest was viable elsewhere.

HIP HOP



"Hip hop is close to Arabic culture in a way - it's based on poetry and Arabs are very fond of poetry," El Deeb

Provided an important platform for communication. A way to create moral support and encourage a spirit of resistance against the regime.

TUNISIA

 Hamada Ben Amor performs under the name El Général



- His songs, "Rayes Le Bled" (Dec 2010) and "Tounes Blanda" led to his arrest in early January
- His arrest sparked public protests in his favor
- Since President Ben Ali fled office, he has composed dozens of revolutionary rap songs



- Mohammed el Deeb





- The pseudonym he uses suggests both deep piety and a respect for writing, as Hassan Ibn Thabit was the favorite poet of the Prophet Muhammad




HIP HOP WITH A GLOBAL REACH
